I have been unable to get infor-nation as to the numbers type at CCI, They don't talk about the "numbers" like they did at GBCI. This transfer has been the WORST of all. I fear my safety Horse here at CCI than I did at GBCI. The conditions of provide scap in cells to wash hands with & nick excuses they are "OUT" They don't allow cell-cleaning. They are LAZY and don't want to allow phone calls. There are anywhere from there are 15 (in DS-2/"Step 2 & 3). They leave the phones at one call For 1-1" a hours for certain innectes, and never get everyone's phonecall completed on I shift. We only have a days to make calls in seg. Too, if the staff do not like you? They say you only get 3 attempts, or else you lose your call for that day! The other concerns that piss me off is the phone company that has a separate phone "systems". At Waypun (MCT), and CCI, they are have IC Solutions, but the phone "system" is "Century Link. CBCT's company & phone "system" is IC Solutions. What I mean is really, that the phone of CCI (& MCT) uses a PIN, as well as a "Voice recognition" ("United States of America"). CBCT only has the 10 digit

PIN. However, the voice recognition is almost impossible to get past. And most often causes us to attempt 3 attempts, causing us to forfeit the call. Too, there is rarely any "make up" calls as staff lie and states that we got through, or call not accepted. But at CBCI we only had the 10 digit PIN. I really don't understand why it is different, but I honestly believe this is done intentionally, to dery us phonecalls. As well, the staff DO NOT clean sanitize the phones like GBCI did. I am working hard on exhausting all my grievances on those issues. I am trying to exhaust every issue, I am finally hoping to go to GP any day now. I've filed the one complaint at CBCI, but was dismissed the day before my transfer. I would like to send you a copy but I would like to Know it we can send you those documents using Legal Loan Aside from the above, I am now being forced to double cell. I am in a cell with Micholas Dalrymple #1065509 who previously had COVID, and I have been sharing some of the things you've sent. allowing anything but backs (whereasth or invoice, etc.) or materials from internet etc. I wentioned the "Destress the form for this, so he can better understand this. He is a POEM Writer and I thought Maybe this would help him while waiting release in February. Hease keep me up to date on everything. Also, let me Know if I should send all the complaints, as I would like to be a defendant in the case, Be SAFE, and take care

# CONTINUED ACTION AGAINST POLICE

In the two months since our last issue of this newsletter, protests against the police and white supremacy have showed no sign of slowing down. Demonstrations in Milwaukee have continued to occur every day, as has been the case in other cities around the country. Recently the federal Department of Justice declared Portland, Seattle, and New York City "anarchist jurisdictions" on orders from Trump to block funding into "lawless zones". This comes after continuous uprisings against oppression in those cities, even as the wildfires on the west coast have been raging for a month on end.

In one of the most recent displays of the egregious lack of police accountability, a grand jury handed down a decision on indictment regarding the murder of Breonna Taylor on

September 23. Only one of the three Louisville Metro Police Department officers who opened fire on March 13 was indicted, and even then, it was not for his role in her death. Instead, Brett Hankison was indicted for "wanton endangerment" in opening fire from outside her apartment, due to the risk it placed on the people living in the apartment next door. The actions of the other two officers were deemed justified. "Kentucky Attorney General Daniel Cameron said neither Sgt. Jonathan Mattingly nor Detective Myles Cosgrove were indicted Wednesday because Taylor's boyfriend, Kenneth Walker, opened fire before they started shooting" (WSB-TV Atlanta). The lawyer representing her family immediately cried foul. "If Brett Hankison's behavior was wanton endangerment to people in neighboring apartments, then it should have been wanton endangerment in Breonna Taylor's apartment too. In fact, it should have been ruled wanton murder!"

Closer to home, last month saw further uprisings in response to the shooting of Jacob Blake by members of the Kenosha Police Department on August 23. That night saw fires, broken windows, and looting at and around the Kenosha County courthouse. The following day, the county declared a state of emergency and 200 national guard members were deployed. This could not quell the movement, and that same night, a Department of Corrections building burned.

Things quickly turned darker on August 25, when 3 protesters were shot by Kyle Rittenhouse, 2 of whom were killed. Shortly before the shooting, KPD had been filmed giving water to counter-protestor "militias" and saying they appreciated them being there. Kyle was then not only able to walk towards the police line with his hands up despite shouts that he just killed people, he was allowed through the line and got home.

The police response to protests against police brutality only further shows why those protests are necessary in the first place. Day

### **COVID-19 INFORMATION**

#### Numbers

According to the Wisconsin Department of Heath Services, as of September 27, 2020, there have been 115,862 positive cases of COVID-19, with 7,095 people having been hospitalized. This is an increase of 2,217 positive cases from the previous day. There have also been 1,399,218 negative test results, for a total of 1,515,080 tests performed and a positive rate of approximately 7%. An estimated 1,281 deaths are attributed to COVID-19 in the state. In total, an estimated 82.4% of the population testing positive in Wisconsin have recovered from COVID-19.

The DOC reports a cumulative total of 1,108 incarcerated people testing positive, with 905 of those having recovered. Unfortunately, we know people in prison are denied COVID-19 tests and that it is impossible to socially distance given the conditions and structures of confinement. The DOC is also reported to be moving people between facilities without waiting for test results, which actively promotes the sprea of the virus. Recent outbreaks have taken place in the past month, with 135 positive test results on August 21. Outbreaks have centered in Green Bay, Dodge, Kettle Moraine, Racine, Oshkosh and New Lisbon.

As of September 25, 2020, 338 WI DOC staff have reporting testing positive for COVID-19, with 263 having recovered. See chart on next page, as well as 30 positive cases in the Division of Community Corrections and 8 at Copper Lake/Lincoln Hills prison for children. Staff numbers are self-reported, so there are likely higher numbers due to underreporting.

### **COVID-19 Behind Bars**
